SOULS by Roy Chen



ou would never guess that the soul of Grisha, a sullen, doughy, forty-year-old Russian immigrant who lives with his mother in a crumbling apartment building in Jaffa, has been reincarnated again and again.

First as a nine-year-old son of a tombstone engraver in a 17th century Polish shtetl; reappearing as the teenage son of a moneychanger in 18th century Venice; then as a prostitute in 19th century Fez, Morocco; utterly transformed in the Dachau concentration camp; and now in present-day Jaffa.

Maybe Grisha is an honest liar, trying to imagine an ill-fated immigration as transmigration, to create a history for himself more exhilarating than his own vapid existence, or to prepare for something darker. Maybe not. To his mother, reincarnation is complete nonsense. To her, "There's only one life, everything else is metaphor."

Throughout SOULS, from its intriguing prologue to its window-sill-hanging ending, Grisha and his mother wage a battle for the reader's attention and trust and sympathy. But who will win – the soul or the body, fantasy or reality, a mother's desperate love or a son's dark despair?

SOULS is a dazzling and brilliant carnival, a richly detailed and virtuosic novel, both hilarious and heartbreaking, that leaps between eras and cultures, characters and voices, genres and genders, a multicultural panorama of Jewish life over the centuries. A novel about the power of imagination, the strivings of the human soul and the longing for meaning – or at least for connection.

HREE DAYS IN SUMMER takes place in a Lithuanian town between a forest and a river during a golden, calm summer, in a world is about to be destroyed.

Ordinary people live their lives and dream dreams. A frustrated teacher works on his masterpiece and dreams of becoming a writer. A witch worships at an altar to a pagan god. A store manager is doing good business and secretly cheating on his wife, who, for her part, plans to run away and take their strange child with her. The town's pharmacist searches in the woods for ingredients to make his miracle potions, and in the horse dealer's stable sits a tall, hand-some young man, tormented by forbidden love. But all the while, a squat, balding SS officer races on his motorcycle from city to city and village to village.

THREE DAYS IN SUMMER is a chronicle of one fictional town full of grace and heartbreaking beauty. The novel powerfully recounts the final, agonizing days of the Jewish community in a Lithuanian town before its destruction. Through evocative prose, the novel explores the fragility of life and the enduring strength of the human spirit.

When her best friend tries to set her up with a cute guy, she realizes that she is actually falling for the lady neighbor across the street. Their unexpected love story encounters a series of obstacles, and then a body is discovered in one of the apartments in the building. So begins a dark and funny chain of events in which everyone is a suspect.

WHERE ARE YOU THIS SUMMER is book about the surprises that come with turning 40, the deep fracture of divorce, and the human insistence on getting up, after each blow, and falling in love again. Some might say it's a romantic comedy, just with murder.

n a small apartment in Tel Aviv, two women share two rooms. The southern room, everyone jokes, brings good luck: whoever lives there finds their soul mate, gets engaged, and moves out.

When it comes time for Tamar's turn in the magical room, she meets Ari and it all clicks into place. But then she falls pregnant, and discovers that Ari already has a wife, who is expecting a child at exactly the same time.

And so Tamar faces single motherhood. Weary and lonely, she returns to live with her complicated and overbearing mother, who takes over her life and the life of her son. To break free of her grip, she escapes into a relationship with a man she does not love all the while obsessing over her love for Ari.

THE SOUTHERN ROOM is a riveting novel about a woman who dreams of independence and self-reliance, and raising her son on her own terms. For Tamar, her motherhood becomes her haven, her "southern room."

This is a story about femininity and motherhood, forged against powerful forces — familial, national and genderbound. Adva Bolle examines the myths and truths about sexuality and love, dependence and independence, life together and apart. She sketches with a sharp and delicate hand the journey from the beginning of love to its end.

In his younger days, Adam Ben Coleman served as an officer on a ship that transported sheep and calves to slaughter. Now it's 2061 and Coleman is sitting in his cell awaiting trial for his part in the "live transport" industry, now outlawed.

While he fights to prove his innocence, Coleman is forced to examine his past – his relationship with his parents, and with Jane, the ship's veterinarian – with courage and clarity, as he seeks to understand what pushed him towards evil now that he must justify his actions to the world, and to himself.

What happens in a world of shifting values, when society decides to prosecute acts that were once the norm of human life? Does the principle of human equality apply also to animals? Can we achieve true atonement, or will Coleman's trial only cheapen the idea of justice?



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umans have been speaking for 200,000 years, creating art for 80,000, and communicating on rocks, clay, parchment and paper in various forms the last 5000. But a form of writing invented in Egypt now dominates the world: the alphabet.

It may surprise you, but there is only one original alphabet. All alphabets in the world, with their dazzling and dizzying diversity of forms – the "Latin" one you are reading, the Arabic abjad, or Greek, Hebrew and Cyrillic scripts, as well as any other in which each sign stands roughly for one sound – these are all the offspring of that one stroke of creative genius in about 2000 BCE.

This fascinating, smart, accessible book brings together the knowledge of several fields to tell a great story – how the alphabet came to be and what it has meant for the development of human life and potential. The provocative and entertaining story touches on neuroscience, culture, politics and technology, and it poses deep questions about the role of communication in our shared history. Koller's is the first and only book of its kind, a finely-researched exploration of one of our oldest and most brilliant inventions, and about the past, present and future of the alphabet as one of the essential building blocks of our lives.

AARON KOLLER was just appointed the Regius Professor of Hebrew at Cambridge University, the first Jewish academic to hold the role since it was founded by King Henry VIII in 1540. Previously, he was professor of Near Eastern Studies at Yeshiva University. In 2022-2023 he was a Bye-Fellow at Cambridge University and a Visiting Scholar at the Centre for Hebrew and Jewish Studies at Oxford.

THE DARK-ROBED MOTHER by Rachel Tzvia Back

memoir of a poet, literature professor, mother, daughter, sister and partner who investigates the life she has lived with clinical depression, striving to reveal the contours of the darkness that descended on her and how one functions in the abyss.

Back traces her origin story when she learned in her mid-30s that she was, in effect, abandoned as an infant. She writes in an attempt to understand her spiral into darkness. Multi-generational and penetrating, the memoir weaves together a personal story, a family history, Greek mythology and poetry.

This book offers two new and very necessary perspectives to the genre of depression memoirs: the first is the reality of living with high-functioning depression, an iteration of the disease easily, and sometimes fatally, dismissed. The second is the reality of mothering through depression, and the indelible, though often unnamed, marks left on one's children. Back interviews her three adult children on what it was like for them to have a depressed mother, allowing their voices to speak in the pages of the memoir.

THE DARK-ROBED MOTHER is a needed portrait for the gallery of those living with depression.






